My favorite phrase in that song is...

Rest, the Lord is NEAR, refuse to FEAR, ENJOY His love.

But do we? It takes a concentrated effort to learn to rest and enjoy God's love.

I asked my husband what constitutes a 'green pasture' experience for him. He said, it's when we sit at the table, read the Bible together and discuss it. That's when we feel closest to the Lord and each other. It's also when the cares of the day become less burdensome and we realize God is in control.

Another word for rest is 'trust'. Resting in the Lord means we're trusting Him to lead us aright.

I was taking my usual walk the other day and looked up to see a dog walking a lady. It was comical. Here she was in a frenzy hanging on to the leash as her dog proceeded to cross the street, ignoring the traffic and her tugging. I thought how dangerous this would have been if she were anywhere but in that quiet street. The more I thought about it, the more I realized that we're not only like sheep, who have no clue where we're going, we're like that dog, trying to take control of our own leash, and seeking any pasture that suits us at the moment. When we try to lead God, we're in a precarious position. When He leads us, we'll find His pasture to be safer and greener than any we could find.

Psalm 23:2b says...

He LEADETH me beside the STILL waters.

The verb 'leadeth' suggests gentle persuasion. In Biblical days, shepherds didn't drive their sheep, they led them. All day long the sheep followed their own shepherd as he searched for grassy meadows and sheltered pools where the flock could feed and drink in peace. Left to themselves sheep would wander off into the wilderness and die.

When I was a kid, I used to hike in the woods. I always entered from the same place. From that vantage point, it seemed like I could canvas the entire forest in no time. I'd soon find out, however, that it was much vaster than I had imagined.

Our journey through life is much like an expedition through a forest. The only things we really see are the trees in front of us. When darkness sets in, we can't even see them. We get lost when we put faith in OUR ability to find the way. Letting Christ lead us enables us to know God's will, which lights our way.

John 1:4 says...

In Him (Jesus...the WORD) was life, and the life was the LIGHT of men.

We need to trust Jesus to direct ALL aspects of our life. He knows the beginning from the end. John 14:6 says He is the way, the truth and the life. I captured that verse in a poem...

Sometimes I sail in troubled waters of life's storms
And navigating makes me think I'll come to harm
But I can yield the rudder to my Shield and Stay
For I know the One who calls Himself 'I AM the WAY'.

I'm faced with daily choices as I man the boat.

Should I charge forth, trim the sails or just stay afloat?

I'll trust the keel to keep the balance and not be moved.

For I know the One who calls Himself 'I AM the TRUTH'.

The lifeline is securely tied to bring to shore
The mates whose Captain took the trip for them before.
I'm sure there's help for everyone whose soul's in strife
For I know the One who calls Himself, 'I AM the LIFE'.

Experienced shepherds knew the terrain and urged their flocks toward familiar grasslands and streams. The shepherd patiently and persistently encouraged his sheep to the place where their hunger and thirst would be satisfied.

Jesus, our gentle shepherd, knows the terrain we have to face in life. We can trust Him. He leads us beside still waters.

This scene is one of tranquility and satisfaction. The word 'still' depicts peace and quiet. It's also described as a consoling place. Don't we need that after the bumps and bruises we encounter?

Still water is not only calm, it runs deep. Deep water is cold and refreshing. Because the water is still rather than rushing, it relaxes us. It also cools our body and quenches our thirst.

In speaking to the woman at the well, Jesus said in John 4:13-14...

"Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

Jesus also said in John 7:37-38...

"If anyone is thirsty. Let him come to ME and drink. Whoever believes in Me as the Scripture has said, streams of living water will flow from within him."

Psalm 1:3 describes the person who walks with God like this...

He is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season, and whose leaf does not wither. Whatsoever he does prospers.

As Believers in Christ, we're positionally seated in heavenly realms with God, our true pasture, alongside Jesus, the living water, who is seated beside the Father.

Matthew 5:16 states...

Blessed (or happy) are those who hunger and thirst after righteousness.

We hunger and thirst after righteousness when we taste and see that the Lord is good.

King David understood this when he wrote in Psalm 42:1-2...

As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for You, O God. My soul thirsts for God, the living God.

Psalm 107:9 concludes with...

He satisfies the thirsty and fills the hungry with good things.
